

INDIA

The Windamere Hotel, Darjeeling

Situated on the historic Observatory Hill in Darjeeling, The Windamere Hotel was established in the 19th century as a cosy boarding house for bachelor English and Scottish tea planters, and the place was



Windamere Wing. The Windamere Wing is for those who like a secluded and peaceful retreat. The Little Windamere Wing, on the other hand, appeals to those who need to remain in touch with old-world charm, with the modern necessary inputs and outlook. Along with its excellent accommodation and warm service, the hotel is also known for it's Christmas celebrations, which run from 18th December to 1st January every year. The Green Hotel, Mysore

Located in Mysore, around three hours' drive from Bangalore, the Green Hotel was originally Chittaranjan Palace, built for the Mysore princesses. The palace was later restored as a small hotel. With extensive gardens, formal lawns and majestic trees, the hotel is a fitting place in which to relax and to rejuvenate. The hotel has been renovated and furnished, using traditional Indian crafts. It offers comfortable surroundings, friendly staff, and a restful, creative atmosphere. Mysore, the charming town immortalised by RK Narayan in his *Malgudi Days*, provides an excellent base from which to tour South India. The Western Ghats, the coffee plantations of Coorg, the game reserves of the Nilgris and the Ooty hill station—are all within a few hours' drive. The hotel was once selected as one of the "World's Best Ideas" by the Institute of Social Inventions, London. The hotel is also one of the best green hotels in the world. Besides this, the Green Hotel has been set up as a model of sustainable tourism to preserve a historic building and to incorporate, wherever possible, energy saving and environmentally aware practices. SINGAPORE The Raffles Hotel

Declared a National Monument in 1987, the hotel has grown from strength to strength. With its restoration and reopening in 1991, Raffles Hotel today stands as a jewel in the crown of Singapore's hospitality industry, renowned and loved for its inimitable style and unsurpassed excellence in service and facilities.

Raffles Hotel opened in 1887 in a rather sombre-looking old bungalow, known as the Beach House. It was named after Sir Stamford Raffles, the founder of modern Singapore. Tropical suites and sola topis were as much a part of Raffles Hotel's early style as bentwood tables and rattan chairs. Over the years, the hotel has evolved into one of the world's most beloved grand hotels, which has welcomed innumerable celebrities, writers and the royalty. Somerset Maugham once called it the legendary symbol for "all the fables of the Exotic East". Few hotels can look back on more than a century of legendary service to so many distinguished guests, and fewer still have preserved their past with a more loving attention to detail.

Today, Raffles Hotel is more legend than hotel, and is one of the most memorable experiences that travel can offer in today's world. Built by four British entrepreneurs who were looking to start a business in the city, Galle Face Hotel is the only heritage city hotel overlooking the Indian Ocean.

The hotel follows a simple philosophy of offering guests the romance of old-world charm, complete with modern-day luxuries that enhance the experience. A masterpiece boasting



Sam Neil, Charlize Theron, Ethan Hawke, Oprah Winfrey, Donald Sutherland and Colin Farrell and many more have stayed here.

Royalty like HRH Prince Michael of Kent, HRH the Duke of Edinburgh, Queen Margaret of Denmark etc and various politicians and statesmen like Nelson Mandela, Winnie Madikazela Mandela, George Bush (Senior) and Margaret Thatcher have also stayed here.
